
St. Francis of Assisi Elementary School Highlights

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St. Francis of Assisi Elementary School - 5th Grade

Fifth grade will explore the fifth grade curriculum through six International Baccalaureate themes, which make up our Program of Inquiry. Language Arts, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Religion are woven throughout these units. Here are some of the highlights from Fifth Grade:

Fifth Grade Program of Inquiry:

Who We Are: Fifth Graders learn about their heritage and acknowledge the cultural similarities of one another. Our annual fifth grade family tree project allows students to collaborate with their families to learn more about themselves.

Where We Are: Our class discovers how societies and cultures are influenced by the treatment of others throughout history. We will analyze the actions that we can take to ensure human dignity is being met.



How the World Works: Fifth Graders take action by creating an ecosystem that takes into account the indirect/direct impacts of human-beings. Through this unit of inquiry, students gain knowledge about the interdependent balance of organisms and people within systems. Furthermore, at the Maidu historic site and museum, students have the opportunity to expand their understanding of this topic.

How We Organize Ourselves: In this unit of inquiry, Fifth Grade explores various "systems" in place and examine their purposes (government, schools, sports, etc).

How We Express Ourselves: Students explore various forms of art and elements of expression. Fifth Grade students visit the Crocker Art Museum where they grow in their ability to appreciate their senses and recognize how art can reflect one's identity.

Sharing the Planet: Students investigate how people work together to avoid conflict and promote peace in proactive ways. During this unit, fifth graders have the opportunity to lead a school wide IB exhibition on "Harmony Day".

Additionally, fifth grade students will have the opportunity to demonstrate their learning from TK-5th Grade with the IB exhibition.



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
